TOPIC	SF Redistricting + Waymo
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- **WELCOME** (Alice Rogers)
- **Waymo**
Noelle Duong, Government Affairs and Community Relations Manager for Waymo, presented a review of Waymo, an autonomous driving technology company. Its mission is to make it safe and easy for people and things to get where they're going. They began in 2009 as the Google self-driving car project, and in 2016 they spun off to be their own stand-alone company. They have driven over 20 million miles on public roads in 25 US cities. The sensors built into their cars offer the Waymo driver a 360-degree view around the vehicle. Safety is their main goal. 94% of crashes in the US are due to human error. Accessibility is also something they care about, offering in-car and mobile features for blind and hearing-impaired riders. In San Francisco, they feature fully electric cars. Waymo recently announced the "Trusted Testers" Program, where SF riders sign up to potentially take Waymo rides and answer survey questions regarding their service.

- **Redistricting**
Danielle Deibler, VP of Voter Services for the League of Women Voters SF, presented on Redistricting. It is a once-in-a-decade opportunity to redraw SF's supervisor districts to create more fair, equitable representation in our local government. The idea is to maintain equal population for all districts, for a district to be contiguous, and to preserve communities of interest. A Community of Interest is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of effective and fair representation. They share a common issue or cause that binds them together. State redistricting will be done by the end of 2021, but as SF is a charter city, we have until April 2022 to redraw what our new district lines are. Between the last census in 2010 and now, District 6 has seen the largest population growth (12.4%) among the 11 districts. Districts 10 and 11 also saw a large growth. This means that these districts will most likely be redrawn, with adjacent districts being modified accordingly. Public input to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor can have an impact on what your district may look like.

In July 2021, the process began for forming the Redistricting Task Force. By the end of October, California will release census data to cities and counties. Public comment will begin probably the end of 2021, beginning of 2022. By mid-April 2022, the Redistricting Task Force must present the new district map to the Board of Supervisors for review and adoption.
